

HOLD 2 IN GIRL'S FALL FROM LOCKED ROOM

Detain Boston Tutor After His New York Pupil Is Found Beneath Window, Hurt.

DOOR BARRICADED BY TRUNK

Miss Ethel Sutorious, Revived After Long Unconsciousness, Sheds No Light on Act.

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 17.—The police are investigating the finding of Miss Ethel Sutorious, 20, a music student of 447 Fort Washington Avenue, New York, in an unconscious condition in the backyard at 562 Newbury Street early today. The girl roomed on the fourth floor rear at 564 Newbury Street. Her window was open and the door of her room was locked. Barricaded against the door was her heavy trunk.

Recovering consciousness at the City Hospital tonight, twelve hours after she was found, the young woman refused to make any statement that would throw light on the case.

The motive or cause of the act is enveloped in mystery and the police are holding two men pending further investigation. One of these is David Lythgoe, her voice teacher, who conducts a lodging house for students, where the girl lived. The other is Raymond Racaldo, another of Lythgoe's pupils, of 1,038 Boylston Street. What these two may know or have told of the case the police have not disclosed.

Lythgoe and the girl's father are said to be friends. The father is G. Ford Sutorious of the Washington Heights address.

Miss Sutorious had been automobile riding with Lythgoe and Racaldo yesterday afternoon, it was stated. The girl has been studying here the last three weeks, although she had trained here previously under Lythgoe's direction.

The unconscious girl was found at 5 A. M. She was clad in black bloomers, light skirt, black shoes and stockings and a lightweight black coat. The girl was immediately taken to the City Hospital.

The back yards of 564 and 562 Newbury Street are separated by a partition fence about 5 feet high, which extends from the rear house wall part way to the back fence. The spot where the girl was found, on the farther side of the partition fence, is from 8 to 10 feet from the base of a perpendicular line up to the window of her room.

It was stated at the hospital tonight, where the girl had been placed on the danger list, that she apparently had a fair chance for recovery, although fear was expressed that her spine may have been injured.

Relatives of Miss Ethel Sutorious were informed that she had been in-

jured in a fall from a window in Boston through a telegram received yesterday at the home of her father, G. Ford Sutorious, in the Pinehurst Apartments, 447 Fort Washington Avenue, near 180th Street. Mr. Sutorious left the Grand Central Terminal at 4:10 P. M. on a train that was due to arrive in Boston at 10:07 P. M. The young woman's grandmother and other relatives were awaiting information of her condition from her father upon the latter's arrival.

Miss Sutorious is a graduate of Wadleigh High School. She went to Boston three weeks ago to begin the study of voice. Her relatives do not believe she was thrown from the window, but are inclined to think she fell. They recalled last night that the young lady was subject to spells of dizziness, and they said she might have fallen in opening the window for fresh air. They attached no significance to the fact that the door of the room was barricaded, because, they explained, she always made the door of her room doubly secure before she retired at night.
